GOOD WINE CHEAP**(AND GOOD FOOD TO GO WITH IT)**



This month we will focus on wine and food for summer. There are a number of wines that seem just made for an idyllic picnic or for sitting on the lawn at Tanglewood while listening to the classical music and contemplating the stars above. Our selection for those August outings is from Portugal.

Vinho Verde is a wine very fitting for warm summer evenings. It's produced in the Minho province of Portugal. Its name means "green wine", which does not refer to the color of this white wine. Rather, the name suggests that it should be consumed fresh and young. Since it is slightly effervescent, it should also be served well chilled. Its high acidity gives it a crisp taste and makes it a good partner for chicken and seafood, either grilled or in salads. This is a very sensible wine for those hot days ahead, because it is relatively low in alcohol (around 8.5 to 10%).

Some of the good and affordable labels for Vinho Verde include Casal Garcia, Alianca and Aveleda. These brands can be found for \$6 to \$8 a bottle.

The recipe is devoted to the summer barbecue. While you are cooking that chicken or seafood, let me suggest adding some vegetables to the grill. Not only will you be providing something healthy to your family and guests, it is so good that you will think a plague of locusts attacked the serving platter.

**MARINATED ROASTED VEGETABLES**

Simmer squash, zucchini squash, red and green peppers, tomatoes, eggplant and Vidalia onions

Slice vegetables into large enough pieces so they don't fall through the BBQ grate, marinate (at least an hour) and cook for about 5 minutes a side.

Marinade recipe

(actually "Classic French Dressing" from the original Fannie Farmer Cookbook,)

- 1/ 2 cup olive oil
- 2 tbsp. red wine vinegar
- 1 tsp salt
- Ω tsp garlic powder
- 1/ 2 tsp. fresh ground pepper

PUZZLES & QUESTIONS ANSWERS TO LAST MONTH'S PUZZLES:

2. How tall are giraffes? How much do they weigh?

A: Male giraffes are up to 18 feet tall (5.5 meters), including their horns. They weigh 1,800 - 4,300 lbs. (800 - 1,930 Kg.) , averaging about 2,600 lbs. (1,200 kg.). Female giraffes stand 12 - 14.8 ft. (4 - 4.5 m.) tall and weigh about 1,800 lbs. (830 kg.).

The giraffe is the tallest land animal existing. The height of the tallest giraffe found was 20 ft. A giraffe's neck can be over 7 ft. (2 m.) long. Their forelegs are about 10% longer than their hind legs.

Giraffes can sprint up to 37 miles per hour (60 km.hr.), but they cannot run for long.

The giraffe's scientific name giraffa camelopardalis, which derives from its early Roman name, reflects its brown patches, which evoke a leopard, and its face, reminiscent of a camel's.

4. What percentage of the earth does the Pacific Ocean cover?

A: The Pacific Ocean, the largest ocean, covers about one-third of the earth's surface area. It is larger than all the land areas (30% of the earth) combined. It covers 46% of the world's water surface.

The Pacific extends from the Arctic in the north to the Southern Ocean (near Antarctica) in the south, and from Asia and Australia in the west, to the Americas in the east.

The Pacific Ocean has the deepest point in the world - the Mariana Trench, which is in the western North Pacific, and reaches a depth of 10,911 metres (35,797 ft).

6. Who was the first baseball pitcher to make 50 relief appearances in a season?

A: Fred "Firpo" Marberry (1898 - 1976) of the Washington Senators was the first major

league pitcher to make 50 relief appearances in a season. He did it in 1925, when he appeared exclusively in relief, pitching in 55 games and finishing 39 of them.

Marberry's first big season was 1924 when he helped the Senators win their first American league and their first and only World Series. He was in 50 games that year, 35 in relief. He won 11 games, saved 15, and pitched 195 innings, fourth best on the Senators that year. He started game 3 of the World Series, and relieved in games 2, 4, and 7, as the Senators beat the New York Giants to win the championship.

Firpo's record-setting 1925 season helped Washington repeat as American League Champions. He appeared twice in the World Series that year, but despite being well rested, was not called on in the deciding seventh game. Manager Bucky Harris kept Hall of Famer Walter Johnson on the mound the whole game even though Johnson gave up 15 hits and nine runs and lost to the Pirates 9 - 7.

8. How many psychiatrists are there in the United States?

A: According to a 2002-2003 report by the American Medical Association (AMA), there were 45,615 psychiatrists in the U.S., counting child and adolescent psychiatry. Excluding those two branches of psychiatry, there were 39,457. According to the AMA, more than 50% of psychiatrists in the U.S. are 55 years of age or older, 2 - 3 times the rate for other types of physicians. About one-third of U.S. psychiatrists are international medical graduates compared to less than one-quarter of the total physician population.

10. What is the smallest bird in the world?

A: The Bee Hummingbird from Cuba is the smallest bird. It is only 5.7cm (2.25 in.) tall and weighs less than 1/10 of an ounce.

12. About how many cities in mainland China have more than a million people?

A: Estimates differ because the Chinese government has merged some rural areas into the administrative jurisdiction of cities. Foreign observers often estimate population using urban boundaries that exclude agricultural areas.

One British estimate lists 160 cities in China that have more than a million people

14. Name the countries which Yugoslavia has been broken up into.

A: Slovenia, Croatia, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Serbia, Montenegro, Republic of Macedonia, and Kosovo. Kosovo declared its independence from Serbia in 2008 but Serbia has not conceded this. The U.S. and most European countries have recognized Kosovo.

Serbia is the most populous of these states, with 7.3 million people. Bosnia and Croatia each have about 4.5 million people. Kosovo has 1.8 million people, 95% of them Albanians.
