From the Regional Vice Chairman Andrew Heffernan RVC Chat

I enjoy Mensa more than any other organization I am involved with. I think the reason for this is the wide variety of interests and ways to be involved. Trust me, I am involved with some GREAT local organizations. Odyssey of the Mind, American Society of Non-Destructive Testing, AGATE, Public Radio Stations, 5k Running Mentoring, and more. But the focus of these organizations is narrow. And this suits them very well. Mensa does not have small range of focus. We are selective in that only the most intelligent are allowed in, but after that the interests and goals cover the entire spectrum. This is a strength and one of the greatest reasons I love Mensa.

But a largely diversified membership brings with it a similar set of expectations and this can be a weakness as well. And Mensa is not immune to this. Because our members come from all occupations, geographic areas, income brackets, and age groups, it can be very difficult to know how to be an engaging organization for all. It is quite evident that we struggle at this when we acknowledge that 50% of all first year members will not renew. There is lots of talk at the National level about building the Mensa brand and exposing the organization to a wider audience.

While this is important and critical at a National level, we should not let it overshadow where the real challenge is. Where the real potential to revolutionize Mensa exists - with the local groups.

Most members will never attend a National event. Most will never attend a Regional event either. Lots will never attend a local event. And many will not renew because they do not get the value out of their membership. So, the question I ask myself is, "How do I share my LOVE for Mensa with others?" And the answer I keep coming back to is personal connection.

The last board meeting I voted to increase local group funding. This is because the local groups are where members can most easily make the

personal connection with Mensa. The internet is great, but meeting Mensans face-to-face means having the "ah-ha" moment when you realize that there are other intelligent people in this world who understand your ideas, your jokes, your curiosity in all things amazing. If local groups can use funding to host a wider variety of events. then I expect that a wider variety of people will find connect with Mensa. The missing piece is the leadership development needed to support increased local group spending. This was the greatest objection to increased local funding by the Board in March.

Many board members insisted that local groups do not know how to effectively spend funding. I disagree. I think that with more funding the local groups could engage more members, improve retention, and finally bring an increase in membership. Something we have not had some several years.

Since joining the Board I have come to appreciate Mensa even more. There are great challenges ahead for Mensa, and it will need to adapt to the world around it. And I am excited to part of that growth. If you know of areas of leadership development that should be addressed in your local group, please share these thoughts with me. MENSA WINNER - ESSAY CONTEST

Southern CT Mensan Jerry Brooker garnered the first prize in the Creative Urge essay contest sponsored by San Diego Mensa with his essay "The Day that Changed My Life." The prize was announced on May 25 at the Creative uRGe and Science Fair Award Presentations at the San Diego Mensa Regional Gathering

The Day That Changed My Life Jerry Brooker

He sold newspapers and cigarettes from the kiosk at the end of the block where I lived in New York City. During the week, I had to walk past him to use the stairs, my parents' directive, up to the El train walkway which kept me safe from the morning rush hour traffic. I hated it because it made me feel so childish, yet it was the way I had to go to and from my school until I was twelve.

The only Negro I knew then was the young man at the kiosk. Sometimes, we'd exchange a few words, mostly about the Dodgers or the Yankees. I always liked him, probably because he was about my age and because he treated me with kindness, something I received little of at home or in school. I always wondered why he didn't go to school, but never asked. In fact, I didn't even know his name.

Looking back on the day that I will always regret, I realize that my father's prejudice had rubbed off on me, a young boy who thought, as most young boys, that his father was a torchbearer for truth. Yet, he regularly used the N word, and the mosaic of his racism included many colors not white. He probably learned these things from his father whom I never knew, so I cannot say for sure.

Here's what happened on that day. It was a summer morning when I had my baseball gloves and a ball with me as I went down to the corner to ask the Negro boy to play with me. He was walking away from the kiosk on his way somewhere, perhaps home. "Do you want to have a catch with me?" I yelled. He looked stunned that I would ask. I will always remember the tenderness in his eyes. He said No, that he had to go. I responded, "OK, little 8-Ball, go home to your momma."

The way he looked back at me changed my life. I had never seen such hurt in anyone's eyes. It was as if they spoke of the oceans of hatred that had washed over his people for centuries. I had betrayed my overture to play with words of mockery and denigration. He looked as if he wanted to say something back, but his lips were sealed. He turned and ran. I turned inward, where the grip of prejudice, over time, released its hold on me.

After that, I avoided him, but I would peek to see if he was still there, until the day he disappeared and never came back.

I still think of him, even now a lifetime later. I sometimes wonder where he is and if he is happy. Or dead. I wish I could take back the day. To speak with him as I would now. And to call him by the name his mother gave to him.

PUZZLES & QUESTIONS ANSWERS TO LAST MONTH'S PUZZLES:

- 2. How many voyages did the Titanic make?
- A: The Titanic made only one official voyage, its first. Before its first voyage, the ship engaged in sea trials in the Irish Sea on April 2, 1912. The sea trials went for about 12 hours, during which time the Titanic traveled about 92 miles (150 km.). Then the ship left Belfast and sailed to Southampton, England, a journey of 660 miles (1,060 km.), traveling for 28 hours, arriving on April 4. The Titanic left Southampton on its fateful voyage on April 10, 1912.
- 4. When did the word "teenager" first appear in print?
- A: The adjective "teen age" first appeared in print in English in the Canadian publication the Daily Colonist, Victoria, British Columbia, on March 11, 1921. The noun "teen-agers" did not appear in any newspaper or magazine until April, 1941, when Popular Science Monthly used the term. Eventually, about 1960, the word began to lose its hyphen.

- 6. About how many people live in Appalachia?
- A: About 23 million although estimates vary because the region has no clear boundaries. It is generally considered to cover only the central and southern portions of the Appalachian mountain range. While the Appalachian Mountains stretch from Canada to Alabama, Appalachia is recognized as covering the area from the Southern Tier of New York state to northern Alabama, Mississippi, and Georgia.

It was first denoted as a distinct region in the late 1800s, but its name traces back to 1528, when Spanish explorers found an Indian village near where Tallahassee, Florida is now. The Spaniards transcribed the name of the tribe living there as Apalchen or Apalachen, and eventually applied the name to the mountain range and the region.

In 1965, using an economic standard, the Appalachian Regional Commission defined Applachia to include 420 counties and eight independent cities in 13 states, including all

of West Virginia, 54 counties in Kentucky, 52 in Pennsylvania, and 52 in Tennessee, along with counties in New York, Ohio, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, and Mississippi. Many people consider the core Appalachian region to consist of the poorer Appalachian mountain counties of West Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, Virginia, North Carolina, and Georgia.

- 8. How long did these Roman emperors reign: Nero, Julius Caesar, Augustus Caesar, Caligula, Marcus Aurelius, Claudius, Hadrian?
- A: Julius Caesar was never officially an emperor but was part of the First Triumvirate with Pompey and Crassus that dominated Roman politics from 60 to 53 B.C.E. He was voted as perpetual dictator in 48 B.C.E. and ruled until he was assassinated in 44 B.C.E. (the year after he instituted the Julian calendar). Augustus Caesar, the first Roman emper, ruled 48 years and eight months (27 B.C.E. 14 A.D.); Caligula, 3 years and 10 months (37 41 A.D.); Claudius, 13 years and 9 months (41 54 A.D.); Nero, 13 years and 8 months (54 68 A.D.); Hadrian, 21 years (117 138 A.D.); and Marcus Aurelius, 19 years (161 180 A.D.),
- 10. Which World Series team outscored its Series opponent by more than a 2-1 margin yet lost the Series in 7 games?
- A: The New York Yankees outscored the Pittsbrugh Pirates 55 27 in the 1960 World Series yet lost the series in 7 games, when Pirates second-baseman Bill Mazeroski hit a home run in the ninth inning to win the final

game 10 - 9. Pittsburgh won the first game 6 - 4, but then the Yankees won the next two, clobbering the Pirates 16 - 3 and 10 - 0. Pittsburgh recovered to win the next two in New York by 3 -2 and 5 - 2 margins, but in the sixth game, the Yankees blasted the Pirates again 12 - 0, in Pittsburgh, setting the stage for the last game and Mazeroski's heroics.

The Yankees had 90 hits in the Series compared to Pirates 60, and out-homered them, 10 home runs to 4. They had a team batting average of .338 for the Series, while the Pirates hit only .256. The Yankees ace pitcher Whitey Ford shut out Pittsburgh twice and New York's second-baseman Bobby Richardson set a record with 12 hits and won the Most Valuable Player (MVP) award for the World Series. Yet the Pirates won the World Series.

The 1960 World Series featured seven players who won a league MVP award at some time in their careers -the Pirates' shorstop Dick Groat (1960) and Roberto Clemente (1966), and the Yankees' Yogi Berra (1951, 1954, 1955), pitcher Bobby Shantz (1952), Mickey Mantle (1956, 1957, 1962), Roger Maris (1960, 1961), and catcher Elston Howard (1963). The game was Casey Stengel's last as Yankees manager.
