

The March Dinner

Our March dinner speaker was Arda Ocal, a sportscaster who recently moved to Connecticut from Canada to take a job with the World Wrestling Entertainment Corp. (WWE) in Stamford. Mr. Ocal gave an informal presentation of about three hours (we stayed unusually late to hear about his family's migration to Canada from Turkey, and his training, career, and life in Turkey, Canada, and the U.S.).

Mr. Ocal told us that "Growing up in the 1980s in sports-loving Canada, I always had dreams to be a broadcaster with the WWE." His parents immigrated to Ontario, started a business, worked hard, and achieved middle-class status. Mr. Ocal called them "a classic American success story." His father wanted him to carry on the family work ethic and get a practical degree at the University of Waterloo in Ontario, but he didn't want to let go of his dream. So he earned a degree in mathematics and business administration but also spent a lot of time working for the college radio station, doing almost everything to learn the in and outs of the business. He got the chance to do his own show and interviewed some famous wrestling figures.



After graduating, Mr. Ocal worked for financial and tech companies and became a financial success. But he pursued his real love working evenings and weekends at Rogers Communications, a big Canadian TV and radio company. "I did everything I could there," he said. "I hosted every show under the sun." He told us several stories about doing weather shows, variety shows, minor league hockey, lacrosse, baseball, football, boxing—and, most importantly, the independent wrestling circuit. In the circuit, he again took on a variety of jobs: promoting, announcing, commenting, interviewing, and hosting. "I started sending demos of my work to WWE in 2006," he said. "I got my first chance to audition with them in 2009. But I was terrible. I just wasn't ready then. I didn't have enough experience."

Despite this setback, Mr. Ocal continued working, doing a talk show in Toronto and commentary for National Hockey League farm teams. He started working at the Score Sports Network, and there he got a big opportunity. He came up with the idea of a post-game show for wrestling, like the talk shows other sports had. He called it "RAW—Right After Wrestling." It was a hit, and Mr. Ocal got the chance to interview many wrestling stars and talk to fans from all over. Former WWE referee Jimmy Kudasas joined the show, and he learned from him and polished his craft.

He next got a job as a national morning show co-host and reporter, first in Ottawa and then in Vancouver. In the fall of 2014, the WWE asked him to become a commentator. He leaped at the chance and moved to Stamford. Finally, he had achieved his goal. He has adjusted to the states well and has won many new fans here to go along with the loyal fan following he earned on his way up the ladder.

Mr. Ocal let us in on many of the ins and outs of broadcasting, including taking classes to speak Standard American English, also known as American Broadcast English. It is used by announcers in metro American and Canadian radio and television markets because it is considered a neutral dialect and understandable to all U.S. and Canadians. "I had to take weeks of classes to get rid of any trace of regional accent I had," he told us. Several Mensans discussed with him the differences between Standard English and various regional dialects and complimented him on his crisp, professional voice and succinct speaking style.

Now Mr. Ocal is taking "improv" classes to further his training. "A variety of people, newcomers and veterans from different professions, take the class," he said. "We all have to work spontaneously off each other to create scenes from ideas." This was just another example of the way he has continued to learn and work in his profession, as he has done since he first had the dream as a child.

It was past 11 p.m. when dinner concluded. Not everyone stayed late, but everyone enjoyed talking with Mr. Ocal and wished to meet with him again. You can catch him on the web at www.wwe.com.

Answers to Some of the April Chronicle Questions

2. What is the distance from Damascus, Syria, to the German border (km., mi.)?

A: The distance from Damascus to the German Southern border town of Garmisch, which is near the Austrian city of Salzburg, is about 3,350 km (2,800 mi). Walking 5 miles an hour for 12 hours a day, it would take about 56 days to travel the distance.

4. In the book of Job, who were Job's three friends who counseled and argued with him during his time of troubles?

A: Job's three friends and counselors were Eliphaz, a Temanite (Yemen), Bildad, a Shuhite (probably from southeast Palestine), and Zophar, a Naamathite (northwest Arabia). A younger man, Elihu, a Buzite (northeast Arabia), counsels and criticized both Job and his three friends.

6. When did the Bridgeport to Port Jefferson, Long Island, ferry begin service?

A: The first ferry service from Bridgeport to Port Jefferson began in 1872 but the first regular service did not begin until 1883 when the Bridgeport and Port Jefferson Steamboat Company was founded by P.T. Barnum, Charles Tooker, and several others. Barnum was the first president and Tooker was the first captain. In 1983, the company began all-season transportation. It has three ships and carries about 1 million passengers a year. The trip takes one hour and fifteen minutes.

8. Who was the first person to sail around the world solo?

A: Captain Joshua Slocum was the first person to sail around the world alone. He left Boston on his oyster boat *The Spray* on April 24, 1895, and returned to Newport, Rhode Island on June 27, 1898, having circumnavigated the globe and traveled 46,000 miles. He made several stops along the way. In 1900, he wrote a book about his voyage titled *Sailing Around the World Alone*. In 1969, the English sailor Robin Knox-Johnston became the first man to sail non-stop around the world solo. He won a race to achieve this honor, leaving England on June 14, 1968 and returning on April 22, 1969.

10. How long did Sir Edmund P. Hillary and Tibetan climber Tenzing Norgay stay at the top of Mt. Everest when they became the first persons to climb it on May 29, 1953?

A: They stayed there for just 15 minutes. Sir Edmund took one picture of Tenzing, they planted a marker, and then they began their descent, taking some photos looking down the mountain.

12. In major league baseball last year (2015), what was the average distance traveled for home runs (ft. or m.)? What was the average speed off the bat for homers (mph or km./hr.)?

A: If you use standard distance measures, the average distance of a home run in the majors was 396 ft. – 394.6 ft. in the American League and 397.3 ft. in the National League. If you use true distance – a measure that extends the trajectory when the ball hits an object like a tower – the average distance was 398.5 ft. – 396.8 ft. in the A.L. and 400.5 in the N.L.
